PART ONE

Achievements & innovation 2018

Shout about your group's main achievements this year and anything you have done that you consider to be innovative.

We have continued to run walks on most Bank Holidays, all including (usually ending) with refreshments. In one case, we fixed the date to fall into the period of Norfolk County Council's Walking & Cycling Festival, though not as a registered event as we found the terms and conditions onerous. Our most popular event would have been the Easter walk, with 32 bookings, but the forecast (and previous day's actuality) of heavy rain put many off, though we still ended up with 14.

In addition, on Easter Monday we arranged an event for children and families - *A Potter around the Neatherd* - based around Beatrix Potter's characters. There were only 12 entrants, but they all came in spite of the cold and steady rain, and appreciated the event.





A new event was adding a town trail to our programme, building on work done some years ago by the Dereham Antiquarian Society. We had the opportunity to trial this when U3A Wymondham brought a group to the town and were led around the planned route (and made us a welcome donation). The subsequent walk proper was well attended, and gave us further links with St Nicholas Church, Dereham Antiquarian Society, the Mid-Norfolk Railway.

We have now built up all but 100 contacts for our email list (all with appropriate data protection permissions), though some of these may not renew when we refresh the list in 2019. We email regularly, as well as keeping our website (www.DerehamWaW.org.uk) up to date.

In the autumn, we started distributing customised Dereham Walkers are Welcome logo 'stickers' (we have purchased a supply which peel off without leaving a residue). By the end of the year, we had 50 on display, with more still to approach. We have also obtained leaflet holders (again paid for by Dereham Town Council) and placed these in most of our supporting businesses: to date, some 1200+ *Dereham Walks* packs have been distributed through these outlets, which are topped up on a monthly (at least) basis.

Following the success in 2016 of an initial pack of 4 walks, all 3000 of which had been distributed, we had obtained funding last year for a bigger pack of 14 walks, half using our local heritage railway or a bus service to make 'travel out, walk back' routes. The new packs - again 3000, and again free - were launched in February, and by the year end, all but a hundred or so had gone.

Addressing the criteria

1. Demonstration of continued local support for the concept

We have set out quite specifically to work with other groups and organisations in the town wherever possible. In doing this, we have linked with some of the town's businesses and attractions, including The George Hotel, Smile (a Portuguese café), Dereham Windmill, the Mid-Norfolk Railway and Gressenhall Museum; all of these were by arrangement, building up relationships and their knowledge of our activities, as well as promoting theirs. One welcome benefit was the invitation to attend the Model Railway Exhibition run by Mid-Norfolk Railway, to run and benefit from the raffle: we gained good publicity and £77 for our funds.

In 2016, we had been founder members of *Visit Dereham*, a small group seeking to promote Dereham as a tourist destination, as well as raising its profile with its residents. In 2018, this has been essentially absorbed into *aboutDereham*, a larger and more active organisation with similar aims. (www.aboutdereham.org). We are represented on the small steering committee for this group, and also featured in its free leaflet distributed to all 15000 household in the town.

2. Evidence of continued endorsement by your local council

A formal Motion or Minute is not necessary but add other evidence of support or collaboration.

On 12 May 2015, Dereham Town Council formally resolved "to work with those responsible to ensure that all public rights of ways are kept in good order at all times" and has continued to support Walkers are Welcome in a variety of ways.

The Council provides a councillor presence at our committee meetings, and close contact with the Town Council is maintained both through this representation and by virtue of the voluntary Footpath Warden (Ken Hawkins) being a member of the WaW committee, reporting on matters to meetings of the Heritage and Open Spaces Committee. This involvement has enabled input on planning applications affecting the footpath network in the town, in addition to the many more routine matters of path maintenance and usage. Our own website has a link from the Town Council website.

The Town Council also allows us use of a meeting room free of charge and has funded equipment to support path maintenance (saws, hedge trimmer, strimmer, litter picking equipment).

We have been actively consulted as the Town Council has worked to develop its Neighbourhood Plan.

3. Indicate a commitment to ensure that the local public path network will be maintained in good condition

Give examples of how your group has been involved in monitoring and improvements to your PROW area network.

Our Chair, Ken Hawkins, is also Footpath Warden for the Town Council, and has undertaken to monitor all of the public rights of way in the town. In this, he is regularly supported by his wife Catherine (also a WaW committee member) with further support from other committee members as required. As well as walking the routes on a regular basis, we have continued to track the maintenance and clearance work we have done, including two litter picking sessions:

- April 2017 to March 2018: 112 hours of work, plus 43 hours monitoring
- April 2018 to December 2018: 65 hours of work, plus 19 hours monitoring

Norfolk County Council values path monitoring work by its volunteers at £20 per hour, and on this basis, we have completed work to the value of about £4800.

We have been pleased to know that the claims for Definitive Map Modification Orders submitted last year, on which we and The Ramblers worked closely with the Town Council, have now resulted in the recognition of 6 new Restricted Byways in the town.

3b. And other facilities and amenities

This might be actions to save public toilets or a car park, boot cleaners etc.

Walkers are Welcome, Dementia Friendly Dereham and Friends of Dereham Memorial Hall joined last year in seeking improvements to Dereham's town centre pedestrian signage, which was out of date and often irrelevant to visitors to our town. As part of *aboutDereham*, we have been successful in obtaining £5k funding from Breckland District Council for a professional study of signage needs, modernising the pedestrian signage so as to give visitors the information they need and increase visitor engagement.

4. Ensure adequate marketing of WALKERS ARE WELCOME status.

You have worked hard to become accredited. How do visitors to your community recognise this? Provide information of where WaW window stickers are displayed and examples of the logo in print and online. Have your activities been mentioned in newspapers or magazines? Have you a website and do you use social media?

Our walks are featured on the national Walkers are Welcome website, plus the Breckland District Council and aboutDereham websites. We submit press releases to the local (Dereham Times) and regional (Eastern Daily Press) newspapers. We now have 50 Walkers are Welcome logos on display in the town, all but a few accompanied by our *Dereham Walks* packs. We had an article published in *Blastpipe*, the journal of the Mid-Norfolk Railway, about one of our walks using their train.

We have distributed some 470 *Dereham Walks* packs to 9 neighbouring parishes, through whose areas our linear walks run.



We have a regularly updated extensive website (www.DerehamWaW.org.uk), which holds local event details, a link to the National website, reports of committee meetings and more besides.

In addition to the 'Dereham Walkers are Welcome' banner, we have also just bought a pop up banner for indoor use - more fragile, but also more colourful.



We have discussed using social media, and consider this would be a useful addition to our publicity work, but have so far not identified anyone who would take this on for us, the existing committee members all feeling they already have enough to do.

4b. National WaW

How are you promoting the national brand and how are you getting involved? What actions are you taking to promote the network nationally and/or regionally? e.g. attendance at meetings, mentoring other towns, exchange visits, national press releases etc.

National: We ensure full reference to the national organisation on our website, and with information always presented at the bottom of our press releases (from where it has sometimes been picked up). Our Chair is a member of the national committee. Both he and 2 other committee members attended the Annual Get Together.

Regional: We have attended the quarterly meetings of the Suffolk Alliance of WaW towns and villages; our Chair is mentor to these towns and villages.

We have continued our good working relationships with Cromer, with whom we exchange committee papers, and have provided support to Aylsham as it has worked towards reapplying for accreditation.

5. Show how use of public transport has been encouraged.

How are you promoting the use of public transport e.g. developing bus or train walks. If you have little or no public transport, are you looking for opportunities to improve or lobby for better services?

Dereham is not on the main rail network, though does have a heritage railway - the Mid-Norfolk Railway - which provides a seasonal and limited connection. In addition to local bus services, Dereham also benefits from an express bus service which runs between Peterborough and Lowestoft (and also links other rail connected towns). We have included full reference to these services in our walks pack.

We have also used the railway and the bus as an integral part of 7 of the walks in the new *Dereham Walks* pack and arrange at least one of our public walks to use the train or the bus.

During 2018 we gained one extra committee member. We are a small committee, but big enough to get things done. We write our Annual Return throughout the year, and this provides a regular reminder of the criteria we need to meet, so ensuring we stay on target.

Dereham Town Council - funded hedge trimmer, litter picking equipment and leaflet holders, also gives free use of meeting room

Most of our funds comes from the charges we make for our public walks. These are nearly always arranged in conjunction with a partner which provides the 'coffee and cake' at the end of the walk: we agree an overall cost which pays them a fixed sum, and we take a small sum to meet our costs.

In total, our income was

- £213.50 net surplus from our walks
- £77 as a result of running the raffle at the Model Railway Exhibition (offered as a result of establishing good links)
- £15 donations at our Annual Public Meeting
- £32 for running our town walk for Wymondham U3A
- £175 from a quiz

Community Advantages

It is always useful to receive anecdotal or measured evidence of ways in which WaW status and your efforts have helped your community and your local economy. e.g. increased car park revenue, increased occupancy levels in accommodation, new businesses opening to cater for walkers. We still have no hard evidence to offer on this. All of our car parks are free, and we have few hotels or B&Bs (though have contacted all of them and all are displaying our logo and/or have promised to take our *Dereham Walks* packs).

We have had a very good take up of *Dereham Walks* packs especially through the Library, but also from shops in the town and from adjoining parishes, all of which suggest local and visitor appreciation. Other indicators are our membership of *aboutDereham*, the steady increase of numbers on our mailing list, and through the links we have made with other bodies such as Mid-Norfolk Railway and Dereham Antiquarian Society.

We plan

- a similar programme of walks as for 2018, including a family/child friendly walk
- identification of additional walks, including a visit to a Suffolk WaW town (Clare)

- maintenance of publicity especially through logos and Dereham Walks packs in the town
- a further print run for the *Dereham Walks* packs
- production of a web map and descriptions of all public rights of way in Dereham
- a full path report for DTC, agreed in principle for publication
